



# SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY SURVEY 2021


The New Brunswick Environmental Network (NBEN) has asked K-12 schools in the province to participate in the completion of this survey. Our goal is to help provide relevant information to stakeholders and communities concerning sustainability education and activities within the schools of New Brunswick. These stakeholders can then provide relevant resources to the schools, and schools will be more equipped to advocate for missing tools. The following results are from the Anglophone, the Francophone and Band-run school districts.

**Data Analysis:** Submissions from the same school were compiled together. In some cases, multiple teachers from the same school answered the survey. Where the answer for a question was the same among teachers from the same school, those duplicate answers were counted as one. Where answers were different for the same question, those answers were treated independently.










